GEAPS Continues Planning for In-Person Conference in August

GEAPS is moving forward with planning for GEAPS Exchange 2021, Aug. 6-9 at the Greater Columbus Convention Center in Columbus, Ohio. How the Columbus Convention Center Keeps Visitors Safe

- Sterilizers on all escalators The escalator handrail sterilizers use UV-C lights to continually sterilize the escalator handrails in real time so you can hold on without worrying about touching common surfaces. The UV-C units are mounted on the bottom of the escalator handrail outside of view to prevent direct UV-C exposure.
- Air purifiers in all elevators HEPA systems inside elevators pull air out of the cab and circulate clean air throughout.
- Additional hand sanitizers The convention center has added hand sanitizer stations throughout the facility.
- **Touchless ticketing for parking** Push buttons on ticket dispensers have been replaced with proximity readers. These readers eliminate the need to touch entry devices to obtain an entry ticket. You just reach towards the device and a ticket will be dispensed.

GEAPS Delivers on Mission with Outstanding Virtual Conference

GEAPS completed its first ever virtual conference in February, executing our mission to advance grain industry knowledge and information sharing through a network of global agriculture professionals. The event drew 340 attendees from seven countries and 159 companies together for education sessions, a virtual trade show and networking lounges.

For Tom Waletich, regional safety manager at Agtegra Cooperative, *Minneapolis Chapter*, it was his first time attending a virtual conference. He enjoyed the first leadership workshop, *Change is Fuel*, and how the speaker broke everyone into small groups in Zoom to help people open up to conversations.

"The workshop was a good reminder to think outside of the box and not be scared to try new concepts," Waletich said. "I have reached out to several of the presenters requesting more information on equipment and procedures that they use for safety and maintenance projects."

Cristian Valenzuela attended the virtual event from Chile, where he manages the biggest dry bulk export facility in San Antonio. He said

he learned about new products and technologies, while making new connections in the industry.

"I was looking for international conferences and exhibitions to improve my knowledge and find new state-of-the-art suppliers," Valenzuela said. "GEAPS is a good way to achieve those targets and I expect to attend your conference in Columbus in August with three to four of our terminal tech staff."

GEAPS International President Jeff Jones, MKC, is proud of the way GEAPS pivoted to produce the online event. His company had 16 employees attend.

"This conference was filled with opportunities for self-improvement and personal growth, as well as industry tips and tricks. I'm excited to take several of the ideas back and implement them with my team," Jones said. "MKC put an emphasis on training like this. Our team has already had several conversations around implementing what we learned."



In addition to the education, attendees exchanged 650 messages on the virtual platform and attended 309 appointments with exhibitors.

GEAPS First Vice President Barb Grove, Central Valley Ag Cooperative, was impressed by the energy of the opening keynote every morning and the positive energy in the sessions. Over the course of three days, she attended a balance of leadership and operations sessions that helped her grow in different ways.

"I loved the interactive nature of the education sessions. We were able to ask questions as they came up and interact with other attendees," Grove said. "One person's question or comment could spur conversation from others and it was a very supportive environment for feedback. I think there is a lot of opportunity for GEAPS chapters to build off this event and host more virtual chapter meetings. We could really drive engagement by embracing more technology."

Dr. Gretchen Mosher, Iowa State University, serves on the Exchange Education Programming Committee and helped plan the education for the event. She was pleased with the quality of the speakers and their ability to engage attendees in the digital platform. She agreed that there was potential for chapters to engage in virtual events.

"The Greater Iowa chapter has already been embracing technology for meetings and has used technology to facilitate guest speakers and other events," Mosher said. "As we move forward, I think the technology offers options for meeting planners, especially during the winter when the weather makes travel difficult."

GEAPS Executive Director Steve Records noted how the online conference delivered on GEAPS' mission to advance grain industry knowledge through a global network of agricultural professionals.

"Two-thirds of our attendees were GEAPS members," Records said. "It was excellent to see our network come together on this virtual platform, building their skills together. The conversations and the encouragement felt just like a GEAPS meeting on a grand scale. We are going to continue planning ways for the industry to connect virtually and we are very excited to host our in-person conference this summer."

GEAPS Exchange 2021 is scheduled to take place Aug. 6-9 in at the Greater Columbus Convention Center in Columbus, Ohio.

The system was implemented in time for January courses this year and so far users have commented on how easy it is to navigate and complete courses. The platform is currently a home for distance education courses and in the future it will include free resources for GEAPS members – including full-length courses, on-demand hour-long Crash Courses and curated content from industry partners.

Bernie Jansen, VAA LLC, Reflects on 35 Years in the Industry

Tell us about your company, and your career to this point.

VAA, LLC emerged from Van Sickle Allen & Associates (VAA) and Grain Facility Design (GFD). The companies started in 1978 and were founded by Dick Van Sickle and Chuck Allen. Van Sickle Allen was primarily offering civil and structural engineering for commercial and industrial projects while GFD was focused on ag related work.

The two firms merged to form the current company structure. I joined them in 1985 after graduating from Dunwoody College of Technology and spending six years working for a general contractor. I started as a drafting technician at VAA. We were relatively small at the time, only about a dozen people. After a few years I shifted to GFD and worked with Gene Haldorson using my previous experience on grain projects and slipform construction with a design build contractor.



Gene and I started handling project management duties for clients and eventually I started handling some of those relationships and work assignments on my own which led me to a project manager promotion. Together we helped build VAA's reputation in the ag industry and I kept

moving up the ladder being promoted to associate, senior associate and named as a firm partner in 1998.

We added engineering disciplines for industrial architecture, electrical and mechanical to our existing service offerings of structural, civil, track design and general arrangement. I stepped back from ownership a few years ago and now serve as a senior project manager and help with business development.

VAA has evolved into a full-service engineering firm able to take on larger multidiscipline projects across the United States and Canada – adding structural marine design capabilities and a team to perform dust hazard analysis.

You've been involved with GEAPS since 1995. Why did you first get involved, and what do you get out of it today?

I was not involved with GEAPS during my first seven years at VAA. Again, we were small at the time so Dick and Gene were more involved with GEAPS. I was asked to lead other areas to help diversify VAA's ag work, so I focused on feed (AFIA), flour (IAOM), ethanol (ACE & FEW) and local co-ops (MGFA

and NDGDA). When Dick became less involved in GEAPS in the mid 90s I decided to join so we had good representation – those were some big shoes to fill. I could see how much he and Gene enjoyed being in GEAPS and they had always told me stories about their involvement.

I get so much from being a member, always wanting to learn about the latest industry trends and spending time with all the other wonderful people who are members. GEAPS Exchange allows me to see a lot of people in one place and joining in on some of the other activities is always fun. Being a member also goes a long way in garnering respect within our industry.

How has the grain industry changed since you've been a member?

- Safety has become the number one priority. This has always been a passion for me and VAA. My first project out of school was reconstruction of the Westwego terminal after an explosion. I was on site during reconstruction and saw first-hand the kind of damage a dust explosion can do.
- Consolidation of co-ops has driven larger-scale projects.
- · Speed and size of facility operations has increased to serve increased volumes and transportation incentives.
- People have changed. Some have retired out of the industry or passed on.
- Design methods are more sophisticated now with 3D capabilities, 3D scanning and on-going technology improvements.

How has the pandemic affected VAA in general and your job specifically?

Most of our of our staff is working remote, so there has been less personal contact. We and our clients have travel restrictions, so it has been difficult to get to sites or client offices for visits. This has led to a lot of virtual meetings.

We have been missing in-person trade shows quite a bit and there has been an uptick in clients wanting to rush hand sanitizer projects through design. We have also been hiring quite a few people across the firm, especially on our structural, mechanical and general arrangement teams. The onboarding of new employees has been virtual which has been a change as well.


I am proud to work for a company that understands our people and their safety are our most important asset. We have been able to keep everyone employed at our facility safe through regularly updating and strongly enforcing COVID-19 safety protocols. We understand that it's not just about us. As an export elevator, many farmers delivering grain to elevators and co-ops in the Midwest rely on us. Our overseas customers rely on us, too, to help keep the grain supply chain moving. We are doing and will continue to do everything in our power to keep everyone safe and healthy while keeping up our responsibilities to our customers on both ends of the supply chain.

What is something unique about the grain industry in your region?

As an export elevator on the Puget Sound, we are entirely dependent on rail for all the grain we take in. We take shuttle trains from both the BNSF and UP railways. Many people, myself included, assume that an export elevator in Tacoma, Washington would mainly export wheat. However, due to our supply chain, we export mostly corn and soybeans. We also are one of the few export grain elevators in the U.S. with no draft limits due to our natural deepwater port. We load vessels to arrival (disport) draft limits, to maximum contract specification, or we load them completely full. We load around 2.7 million bushels of grain on many of our vessels. This takes us about three days.

Kristen explained that we're more or less tied to our jobs and we're not taking proper "me" time to reset ourselves; that anxiety builds and builds. It's important that if a person needs to take the long way home or to work, that they do that. If an employee is having an off day maybe they need to take a little longer lunch.
