TREASURER'S REPORT

GEAPS Reports Solid Financial Position for 2018-2019, Braces For Challenges in Next Fiscal Year



2018-2019 Fiscal Year Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to report that GEAPS remains in a solid financial position. We ended our 2018-2019 fiscal year with more assets and fewer liabilities than the previous year. While we ended the year "in the black", it's the closest we have been to a break even budget in years. The 2019 calendar year has been a challenging year for the industry, and I believe we will see that reflected in the 2019-2020 fiscal year.

Revenue

Total revenue for the fiscal year was \$4.03 million, up 3.81 percent over the previous year. Membership dues were down roughly one percent, and made up 19.34 percent of total revenue. The biggest revenue source for our association

remains GEAPS Exchange, our international trade show and technical exposition, which accounts for 67 percent of total revenue.

The decrease in membership dues revenue is one of the most concerning trends we have identified in recent years. Five years ago, we had 2,303 paid members (Regular and Associate), at the end of this fiscal year we had 1,927. To help combat this trend, we have frozen membership dues and are looking at ways to update our pricing model, in addition to attracting and retaining more members.

Expenses

Total expenses for the fiscal year were \$4.02 million. We trimmed over \$400,000 in expenses from the previous fiscal year. Our volunteer leaders and GEAPS staff met expectations in managing programs and services.

Strategic Planning for the Future

While we are financially strong at present, we recognize that GEAPS is operating in a challenging environment. We have identified some concerning trends in engagement with our programs that we expect to continue in the near term. As part of our planning for the future, we are considering numerous initiatives to deliver more value as we look to grow GEAPS.

To that end, GEAPS recently donated \$1.24 million to the GEAPS Foundation to complete the initial investment goal of the endowment fund (learn more on page 15). This allows the Foundation to become fully operational, which will provide support for GEAPS Professional Development Programs. That should have a noticeable impact on our financial report at this time next year.

While the next couple years could be challenging financially, we have the resources to withstand any short-term challenges while we continue to grow and evolve into the future.

- Any GEAPS member may submit nominations for the International Board while only Associate members may submit candidate recommendations for the Associates Board.
- Only Regular members are elected to the International Board and only Associate members may serve on the Associates Board.
- Nominees to the International Board of Directors and Associates Board of Directors must be willing to invest their time and out-of-pocket expenses to actively serve as board leaders.
- Complete nomination criteria can be found on the separate nomination forms.



How GEAPS Members Create Courses and Sessions

In order to make sure education programs reflect current best practices and standards from across the industry, GEAPS relies on our members' expertise to create sessions and programs. GEAPS members identify relevant topics and work with GEAPS staff to identify experts and refine presentations.

Exchange Education

The Exchange Educational Programming Committee (EPC) plans all of the education sessions for GEAPS Exchange each year. Here's how sessions come together:

- · Call for proposals opens for Idea Exchange, Expo Pods and concurrent education sessions in the spring.
- Once the call for proposals closes, EPC members grade submissions.
- The group selects some of the best and most relevant topics for the Opening and Closing workshops.
- During a July meeting, the EPC selects topics based on grades and group conversation.
- If there are particularly hot, in-demand or timely topics in the industry, the committee may seek out additional speakers.
- Once the EPC selects sessions, committee members recruit and develop speakers, ensuring that deadlines are met and that speakers have a good experience.
- For 2020, the Expo Pod theme is 'confined spaces'. The EPC picks the topics for the Pods several years in advance and works to match education to the theme.

GEAPS/K-State Distance Education Program, Experiential Learning and Other Programs

Other education programs fall under the domain of the Continuing Education Program Oversight Committee (CEPOC). This committee serves a variety of roles with course and program development within GEAPS. They generate concepts and ideas for new products, vet programs to ensure they meet industry standards and serve as a workforce to help find subject matter experts.

Distance Education Program Courses

For new course development, the CEPOC helps identify needs or themes to address. Then they establish a task force to help define course goals, develop curriculum and create the pedagogy - how it's taught. The task force helps find, recruit and recommend subject matter experts to help develop the course.

For a course update or overhaul, a task force starts with a thorough review of curriculum to ensure it's current and still a best practice in the field. From there, they help find and recommend subject matter experts to develop content.

The CEPOC is also involved with Experiential Learning programs: Hands-On Training (HOT) Program and Grain Elevator Managers (GEM) Course. They provided the original idea for the HOT Program and are involved with major overhauls and updates as needed.


What is the best advice you have received from another GEAPS member?



GEAPS staff took care of setting up the webinar online and provided a basic list of requirements for the venue. To broadcast the meeting we needed to have a good internet connection, a video camera and a microphone. The presenter also needed to be comfortable and ideally experienced with giving webinar presentations. They would also need to have a good PowerPoint presentation. GEAPS provided the video camera and microphone. The venue that we hold most of our meetings at already had a good internet connection.

Dr. Charles Hurburgh, Iowa State University, was the presenter for the webinar. He is a very experienced presenter and has been a great resource for our chapter. He was a great fit for our first live-streamed meeting. If you use the new Speakers' Bureau in the Chapter Leader Resources section of the GEAPS website, I'm sure you will also be able to find polished speakers in your region.

To help spread the word, the webinar invitation was sent out to all *Greater lowa* chapter members, all leaders of other chapters and the Membership and the Chapter Resource committees. The live webinar had 40 people attend. GEAPS staff was able to provide our chapter with the list of participants on the webinar so we could see if members that regularly attend meetings were choosing to just watch the webinar. After our chapter officers reviewed the list, we determined that this was not the case.

Our chapter will also live-stream Dr. Dirk Maier's, Iowa State University, presentation "Aeration and Grain Quality", on Nov. 19. GEAPS staff will be providing the equipment and assisting with streaming the webinar. Our chapter does have concerns that live streaming our chapter presentations could lead to lower meeting attendance. We plan to review the list of webinar participants after each webinar to help make informed decisions on how the webinars are affecting meeting attendance.

This is the last live webinar the chapter has planned for this year and we will discuss having future live webinars at our next planning meeting. I look forward to hear how other chapters are using technology to reach a broader audience as well!
